

Nursing (R.N.) Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) to Registered Nurse (R.N.) Associate in Applied Science

NURSING APPLICATION PROCESS

The Nursing program has special admissions criteria and limited enrollment. Applicants are responsible for meeting all requirements of the program and provide all requested documents to JJC. Only complete files are considered.

REQUIREMENTS

Nursing (R.N.) Applicants – All applicants must complete a Certified Nurse Assistant (CNA) course at JJC or elsewhere, be eligible on the Illinois Health Care Worker Registry, and have passed the Certified Nurse Assistant (CNA) certification exam.

Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) to Registered Nurse (R.N.) Applicants – All applicants must have a valid LPN license in the state of Illinois and prior learning as evidenced by a valid Illinois LPN license which will allow 13 nursing credits to be awarded after student successfully completes NURS 170 – LPN to RN Transition (6 credits) which is taken prior to the nursing course sequence.

Vaccines - All nursing programs strongly recommend that all students be fully vaccinated and boosted for COVID-19 prior to entrance into the program in order to complete the clinical requirements of the program. Proof of other immunities and/or vaccinations, a drug screen and criminal background check are also required and will be communicated to applicants when provisionally accepted into the program. If a student is accepted into the program and fails the criminal background check or drug screen and/or does not have the mandatory vaccinations, the student will be removed from the program.

APPLICATION PERIODS

Nursing (R.N.) Program

Begin Nursing in the Fall Semester (August 2025)

Apply between May 15 - 31 (transcripts must be submitted by March 1)

Begin Nursing in the Spring Semester (January 2026)

Apply between October 15 - 31 (transcripts must be submitted by August 1)

<u>Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) to Registered Nurse (R.N.) Pathway</u> Begin Nursing in the Spring Semester (January 2026)

Apply between October 15 - 31 (transcripts must be submitted by August 1)

NOTE: The LPN to RN NURS 170 course will not run in the FL25 semester.

NURSING ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENT

Students must:

- 1. Meet <u>residency requirements</u>. Students who are considered residents of the JJC district will be awarded a seat per ranking (see below). If there are seats available after in-district students are awarded a seat, then students who are considered out-of-district residents will be awarded a seat based on their ranking.
- Complete the <u>JJC Application</u>. Follow all steps outlined on the Admitted Students page.
- 3. Submit official transcripts from any college attended before the nursing application deadline (if applicable). Complete a transcript evaluation form. Make sure to select "Associate in Arts" and the correct applicant type located under the Transfer Evaluation Request Information section. Then, order official transcripts from your former college to be sent to the JJC Transfer Credit Evaluation Office. Questions? Email transfercredit@jjc.edu.
- 4. Placement Test/ACT/SAT Scores Students must meet <u>at least one</u> of following requirements.
 - Complete a JJC placement test or submit valid ACT/SAT scores or
 - Complete the required developmental course sequence based on placement test scores (if applicable).
 - Complete previous college credit in English and/or Math with a grade "C" or better (from another institution)
- 5. Schedule an appointment with the general advising center 815.280.2673.
- 6. Complete all required general education courses with a grade "C" or better.
- 7. Complete the Nursing Program Entrance Exam ATI-TEAS (see below).
- 8. Have a cumulative minimum GPA of 2.0 in required general education courses.
- 9. Complete the Online Nursing Application during the application periods only.

NURSING PROGRAM ENTRANCE EXAM

The ATI-TEAS (Test of the Essential Academic Skills Version 7) exam evaluates math skills, reading comprehension, English, and science proficiency.

How to Study for the Exam

- Study guides available for purchase via ATI Testing
- Study guides available in the JJC Library and the Learning Resource Center at the Romeoville Campus

What You Need to Know About the Exam

- Cost: approximately \$97.00 + tax
- Scores from other schools will not be considered
- Must be taken in the JJC Testing Services Office (Main Campus or Romeoville Campus)
- Must be scheduled in advance and paid online
- Must be completed before the application period; can only be taken once per semester
- Only three attempts allowed in a five-year period. Only the first test score of the semester will be considered. You should only take the TEAS test once per semester (scores do not expire).

TEAS Scores & Eligibility

Students who score an 82 or above on the TEAS Composite are guaranteed to be admitted into JJC's nursing program depending on:

- your background check and drug screening
- if there are more students than available seats, ranking will be used to determine who is admitted first (see below). Students who score below 82 will also be ranked. The minimum composite score is 60.

RANKING

Each eligible application is given a number for anonymity and all demographic data is removed. Applications are sent to the Nursing Admissions Committee for final review.

When will I know I have been accepted into the program?

Within 3-5 weeks of submitting the nursing application, applicants will receive an email from the admissions department sent to their JJC email account informing them if they qualified. Approximately 3-4 weeks following the qualification email, an acceptance/denial email is sent from the nursing education department to applicants JJC email account.

Applicants will be ranked based on:

- TEAS Composite Score weighted at 40%.
- Cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher required on courses specific to the required general education courses. All courses must have a grade "C" or better. GPA will be weighted at 60%.

*If a course was taken more than once, the most recent grade will be used. If a student has "clepped" out of a course (CLEP Test), the grade will count as a "C".

General education requirements must include the following (28 semester hours). All general education courses MUST be completed with a grade "C" or better **PRIOR** to submitting a nursing application beginning with the May 2025 application period.

Transfer for your Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN)

Students who want to earn a bachelor's degree in nursing should complete JJC's Associate of Applied Science degree first and then enroll in an RN to BSN program at a four-year college/university.

Another option for students is complete the Associate in Arts degree and transfer to a college/university with a pre-licensure nursing program or nursing major.

JJC has agreements with several institutions. Meet with a nursing advisor to learn more.

Thinking of becoming a nurse out of state?
